When I was in Viet Nam in my first major battle, which happened to be my first 3 full days with my unit, we were being picked up by choppers for stand down back in base camp. When the choppers were coming in I looked up and saw them coming in and could hear the " whop, whop, whop" of the chopper blades, it always put me on guard and fearful, because for me it represented fear that if I could hear them way off in the sky then the NVA could hear them and follow them in and know where we are by the time the choppers got in.

That has bothered me for 39 years, because when I heard that noise by a chopper back in the states it immediately triggered a response to put me back in Viet Nam with fear. So, as fate would have it I moved to east Mesa Arizona where the Apache and Longbow helicopters were being made. Lucky me!!!!

A few months after doing your course I was in the back yard and a helicopter came by and I did not look up or pay attention to its "whop, whop, whop ", a few seconds later it hit me, the noise did not trigger a response in me at all. Wow, was I relieved. A short while later I also realized that it was going through your course that made the difference and since then that's the way it has been, no trigger response.
